SPREAD PREVENTION

<u>YOU</u> can help prevent the spread of coronavirus. The New Orleans Health Department has issued guidelines to reduce the number of people who contract this virus.

Older people and people with underlying health conditions seem to be at greater risk of serious illness. Those conditions include heart disease, lung disease, diabetes, and cancer. This virus is thought to spread between people in close contact (within 6 feet) and through droplets when an infected person coughs or

Prevent spreading COVID-19

COVID-19 spreads between people in close contact and through droplets from coughing / sneezing.





sneezes. Even if you're not showing symptoms, you may be a carrier of the virus.

To help prevent spreading this virus, it's imperative to practice social distancing. If possible, avoid unnecessary contact, avoid contact with immunocompromised people, meet by telephone or by online means, and avoid groups larger than 10 people. If you must be in public, stay back 6 feet from each other.

Coronavirus (COVID-19)



The novel coronavirus, also known as COVID-19, is a respiratory disease that was first detected in China. It has now been detected in many countries, including in the United States.

Symptoms

Symptoms include fever, cough, and shortness of breath and may appear 2 to 14 days after exposure.

Severity

Worldwide illnesses have ranged from mild to severe, including illness resulting in death. Older people and people with underlying health conditions seem to be at greater risk of serious illness. Those conditions include heart disease, lung disease, and cancer.

How it spreads

The virus is thought to spread between people in close contact (within 6 feet) and through droplets when an infected person coughs or sneezes.

Treatment

There are no medications specifically approved for COVID-19. People with coronavirus should be treated with supportive care to help relieve symptoms. Some severe cases require going to the hospital, particularly in the elderly or those who have underlying medical conditions.

What to do if you are sick

- If you recently traveled to an area affected by COVID-19 transmission AND you feel sick, stay home and call your doctor immediately. Do not go to the doctor without calling first.
- If you have a fever, cough, or shortness of breath, call your primary care provider.
- If you do not have a primary care provider, call the Louisiana Department of Health hotline at 1-855-523-2652.
- If you are severely ill and you think you need to go to the hospital, call 9-1-1 or go to an emergency room.

UNEMPLOYMENT INFORMATION

Employees:

Hundreds of New Orleans workers have been impacted by COVID-19. For many, bar, restaurant, and retail closures result in loss of income, which can lead to loss of transportation, housing, and security. If you've been affected by these closures, for now, you can file a claim for unemployment through the Louisiana Workforce Commission (LWC) at www.louisianaworks.net/hire or calling 866.783.5567

Employers:

If you're an employer and have temporarily closed or reduced hours of operation due to COVID-19, please contact the LWC to discuss how they can provide assistance and answer questions regarding unemployment insurance.

Small Business Administration:

The City has requested an Economic Injury Disaster declaration from the Small Business Administration. Once declared, all eligible businesses can apply to the SBA for lowerinterest loans. Once declared, businesses should call 1-800-659-2955 or email disastercustomerservice@sba.gov.

Gig Economy Workers Fund:

The New Orleans Business Alliance (NOLABA) has launched a relief fund to meet the needs of gig economy workers who have been directly impacted via loss of income. Learn more, donate or apply at www.nolaba.org/relief-fund.

PARKS & RECREATION

- All NORD recreation centers and facilities are closed until further notice. Playgrounds and open spaces will remain open, as will tennis courts.
- City Park's mini-golf, tennis courts, City Bark, and golf courses remain open
- Audubon Park's tennis courts, golf course, and nature trail remains open
- Lafitte Greenway's recreation programs are temporarily canceled

UNIVERSITIES

Tulane, Loyola, Dillard, Holy Cross, Xavier, Southern University, and the University of New Orleans canceled in-person classes for all students. Those schools have transitioned to online teaching for the remainder of the spring semester.

CITY HALL

City Hall remains open and functioning, though visiting remains limited to 25 people per

floor. All visitors and City Hall employees will have their temperature read after entering, and those with temperatures of 100 degrees or higher will be asked to leave.

The Department of Public Works continues to respond to service requests. If you need help with any of these non-emergency services, please call 311 or visit nola311.org.

The Sewerage and Water Board suspended water service shut-offs, and is working to restore water service to customers who have been disconnected. If you have an emergency or service request, call 52-WATER (504-529-2837).
