HOLIDAYS WITH THE NEW ORLEANS POLICE DEPARTMENT

For the first time in New Orleans' 300 years, the Mayor and the President of the City Council are women serving concurrently in this second year of our term. I believe this milestone is crucial to driving forward effective policies and departmental strategies that are rooted in inclusiveness and equity. When reflecting on this first year in office, it's worth highlighting that the City Council has seen a lot of impressive "firsts", momentum that drives progressive-thinking, accountability and transparency, and fiscal responsibility. I am proud to serve as the city's first Hispanic American Councilmember alongside my colleague Cyndi Nguyen, the first Vietnamese American Councilmember representing District "E". My first legislative item as Councilmember-at-Large was to create the city's first codified sexual harassment policy followed by a motion requesting the CAO's office to execute its first sexual harassment climate survey for City Hall employees. As the Chair of the Utilities Committee, I led the city in instituting the first renewable portfolio standard in the Gulf South.

We have seen the implementation of our city government's first Industrial Tax Exemption Program review process allowing local authorities to decide when companies are exempt from local property taxes to ensure that they are bringing capital investment and good-paying jobs to our parish. We will also be moving forward in mid-2019 with the city's first Pay Disparity study in concert with the Civil Service Commission to increase transparency. Beyond "firsts", we worked aggressively to address key policy issues: drainage and water management, public safety, and advocating for childhood trauma-informed practices in our schools and recreation systems. This has required constant collaboration with the Administration, nonprofits and advocacy organizations, and by putting boots on the ground in neighborhoods across the city. The following report highlights many of our noteworthy accomplishments with an accompanying appendix which serves to catalogue our complete efforts during this first term.

A RESPONSIVE NEW ORLEANS

Began to Hold the Sewerage & Water Board Accountable for Their Finances and Their Performance to Keep our Streets Dry and Our Water Safe

In response to a letter signed by the whole Council at the very outset of this term - which outlined questions and concerns over billing, infrastructure maintenance, and other key items - the Council's Public Works Committee has continuously held Sewerage & Water Board (SWB) accountable to restoring public confidence in these systems. The Council has remained adamant that the SWB address their flawed billing system and to halt shut-offs to citizens challenging their escalated bills. I remain vigilant in addressing these inefficiencies in close partnership with the Public Works Committee and Councilmember Giarrusso, SWB Board Member Councilmember Banks, and SWB Executive Director Mr. Ghassan Korban. My team also works directly with constituents to assist with reported leaks and billing errors to make sure this utility is responding to the needs and concerns of our neighbors.

Created Local Oversight for State Corporate Giveaway

Since 1998, ITEP has cost the City of New Orleans and Orleans Parish School Board more than \$210 million in lost property tax revenue, due to exemptions rubber-stamped by a state board. In fact, the Louisiana Board of Commerce and Industry has a 99.95% approval rate for companies who seek the local property tax exemption. In 2017, this led to a \$1.9 billion loss to local taxing bodies across Louisiana. Seeing the need for reform, Gov. John Bel Edwards signed an executive order allowing local government bodies like the New Orleans City Council to be included in the exemption process and to set their own rules. This means, finally, we have the opportunity to require better accountability for tax dollars regarding ITEP. I introduced Ordinance Cal No. 32472, along with my colleagues Councilmembers Williams and Nguyen, that sets concrete rules to add transparency to the process and send a clear message to large industrial companies that if they are seeking a major tax break from the city, then we expect them to bring real prosperity in return. What results then is good job creation and investments in distressed areas that need access to opportunity. Resolution R-19-164 sets forth the rules in partnership with the Office of Economic Development and the Economic Development & Special Development Projects Council Committee. To echo the importance of this oversight, Resolution R-19-165 encourages the Louisiana State Legislature to oppose any effort to repeal or diminish this newfound authority of local governments at the state level.



Advancing and Promoting Trauma-Informed Care in Our Schools to Finally Address Untreated Harms in Our Kids

In partnership with Councilmember Banks, United Way of Southeast Louisiana, The Times Picayune, Tulane University, Ashé Power House Theater, Louisiana Institute for Children in Families, Loyola University New Orleans College of Law, and New Orleans Family Justice Center, I hosted a special screening of the powerful documentary “The Children of Central City”. In tandem with a series in the Times Picayune, this event helped to raise awareness about the tremendous impact trauma has had on generations of New Orleans children in every single one of our neighborhoods. To maintain momentum, I put forth Resolution R-18-310 to request the building and implementation of trauma-informed systems within the Orleans Parish school system to include public, private, parochial, and charter school sites. As the resolution indicated, schools play a crucial role in providing stable learning environments that connect all students, especially those impacted by trauma, to compassionate, skilled and responsive adults. In partnership with the Youth Empowerment Project and the Young Leadership Council, we once again screened documentary to bring the film to a new audience. I joined Councilmembers Williams and Banks on Resolution R-18-344 to request the Orleans Parish Children and Youth Planning Board examine issues surrounding childhood trauma and provide key recommendations; I look forward to their presentation at a council meeting during Summer/Fall 2019. I have also spoken directly with NORD Commission and Foundation leadership to stress the need for trainings with coaches and NORD officials that enable them to recognize signs of trauma with children participating in their programs. In March, my staff participated in the Training Grounds’ Brain Architecture workshop at the University Medical Center. Participants engaged in tabletop exercises to explore the powerful role of early brain development and traumatic experiences on long-term life outcomes. Through partnerships with leaders in this space such as the Institute of Women and Ethnic Studies, Tulane Violence Prevention Institute, Louisiana Center for Children’s Rights, Children’s Bureau of New Orleans, and countless others, we can begin to address the pressing needs of our city’s children.

Early Childhood Education and a High Rate of Return

The state of Louisiana spends less than 1% of general revenue dollars on early childhood issues. In response, the Council’s Sports Betting Tax Resolution (R-19-24) requested to work collaboratively with the state legislature in formulating a regime for the legalization and regulation of sports betting, which includes utilizing state sports betting tax revenues for early childhood education, along with a local option to establish, assess, and collect additional local fees or taxes. To reaffirm our commitment to investing in our children’s educations, the City Council allocated \$1.5 million for this issue and is the sole municipality in the state to do so.

Breaking Down Barriers to Assistance

One of the Council’s budget priorities for 2019 was the city’s new Sobering Center which helps to relieve pressure on hospitals and law enforcement. The center would prevent police or EMS from sending nonviolent intoxicated people to emergency rooms and instead give them a bed to sober up under the care of a team from Odyssey House. This is a great first step but we must continue to explore options to increase the number of beds available to those in need and I will continue to work alongside our partners to secure resources in this area.



A SAFER NEW ORLEANS

Authored Comprehensive Sexual Harassment Training, Reporting, and Investigation Law for City Employees

It is crucial that we provide comfortable working environments for public employees and I'm proud that we're the first municipality in Louisiana to put procedures in place. As the lead author, the Council unanimously passed its first codified sexual harassment policy that I also co-authored at the state level. This law follows best practices and puts New Orleans government at the forefront of promoting safe workplaces. The ordinance defines harassment, outlines rules for reporting it, and requires city agencies to keep records of reported harassment and to properly train employees on appropriate workplace behavior. In September 2018, I also authored Motion M-18-386 which directed the Chief Administrative Office to execute a mandatory sexual harassment climate survey to assess the general awareness and knowledge of the city's sexual harassment policies, including employees' experience with and knowledge of reporting. In March, per that motion, the CAO's office presented during an Order of Business their execution strategy for unrolling the climate survey in April 2019.

Ended Unnecessary Traffic Arrests to Free NOPD to Concentrate on Stopping Violence

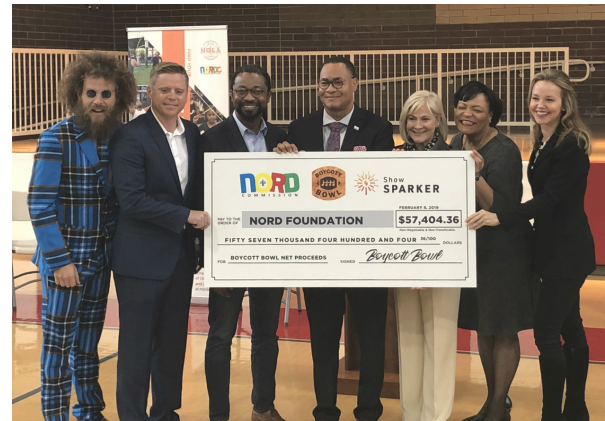
The Council unanimously passed this ordinance to clarify the duties of the New Orleans Police Department Traffic Bureau and update existing requirements relative to traffic arrests and the issuing of citations. Ordinance No. 32,311 amended the existing city law so that traffic offenses may be dealt with through citations, as opposed to arrests, allowing officers more time to focus on preventing violence and property crimes. My office is working closely with State Representative Royce Duplessis (District 93) to support his proposed bill, HB224, which authorizes law enforcement officers to issue a citation in lieu of arrest for persons with a suspended, revoked, or canceled driver's license.

Pushed to Block Domestic Violence Offenders From Possessing Firearms

The New Orleans City Council urged the Orleans Parish Sheriff's Office (OPSO) to begin implementing a new state law that requires sheriffs across the state to collect firearms from individuals convicted of domestic violence or subjects of protective orders. On June 7, the City Council passed Resolution R-18-208 urging OPSO to immediately comply with the law, which had a start date effective October 1, 2018. Since that time, my office regularly meets with leadership from the Orleans Parish Sheriff's Office, New Orleans Health Department, New Orleans Police Department, and other partners to ensure applicable rules and processes are working smoothly.

Taking Steps to End the Barbaric Practice of Jailing Domestic Violence Victims

Resolution R-19-56 condemned District Attorney Leon Cannizzaro's barbaric practice of jailing victims of domestic and sexual violence on material witness warrants. The resolution furthered the efforts of a resolution sponsored by Councilmember Jason Williams in 2017. The vote was accompanied by a presentation from Court Watch NOLA who also supported the resolution in 2017. The Council committed to working collaboratively with the state legislature to address this issue and examine measures to better assist victims in navigating the prosecutorial process. I will be working closely with Senator JP Morrell (District - 3) during this legislative session to support his bill, SB146, which aims to prohibit the incarceration of victims of domestic violence and sex offenses who refuse to testify against their abusers and have already testified in the Senate Committee on this item.



AN AFFORDABLE NEW ORLEANS

Demanded Entergy Lower Utility Rates and Vastly Improve Power Reliability

Over the past several years, the New Orleans community - through the City Council - has asked Entergy to make significant progress on remediating the unacceptable level of "clear skies" power outages and reliability issues and on securing a substantial investment in clean, renewable power generation capabilities. As Utility Chair, I called a special meeting to focus on the lack of progress and to demand answers from Entergy on two key issues: reliability and renewables. Holding Entergy and utility providers accountable to ratepayers is of utmost importance to build faith in our community and to demonstrate the Council's commitment to holding private companies accountable. Resolution R-18-223 noted that bringing increased renewable resources that meet our energy needs isn't just environmentally sound but is also an affordable solution to our electricity needs. New, sustainable resources reduce pollution, create new jobs and industries, and diversify our energy portfolio while making power more affordable for ratepayers over the long-term. We also took initial steps toward creating a community solar program making solar energy more accessible to renters and low-income residents who would in return receive credits on their energy bills in exchange for power generated in the community. The council also approved steps by Entergy New Orleans to install five megawatts of a planned 100 megawatts of solar capacity on city rooftops, and to move up by a full year the installation of advanced "smart meters" that residents can use to monitor, and potentially reduce, their electricity use. Additionally, Resolution R-18-475 directed Entergy to investigate and remediate electric service disruptions and complaints and to establish minimum electric reliability performance standards and financial penalty mechanisms to ensure reliability to the ratepayers.

Established First Real Cross-Parish RTA Routes to Provide Seamless Regional Public Transit

We must support a regional transit strategy that allows our citizens greater access to job opportunities and reduces multiple fare costs and excessive transfers. Joint resolution R-18-332 with Councilmember Kristin Palmer and Councilmember Cynthia Lee Sheng (Jefferson Parish Council), encouraged the RTA, the City of New Orleans Office of Transportation, Jefferson Parish Department of Transportation Administration, and Jefferson Transit to work collectively to address the need for regional transit routes. In October 2018, I was delighted to take the inaugural ride of the RTA #39 Tulane Line Extension to Ochsner with leadership from Orleans and Jefferson Parishes. As of March 2019, the RTA has decided to indefinitely extend its temporary transit pass to two parishes after declaring that a six-month pilot program was successful.

Taking First Steps to Bring Local Control to Increase Minimum Wage

In partnership with Step Up Louisiana and Councilmember Williams, I co-authored the Minimum Wage Resolution, R-19-144.



Our people deserve a chance to earn a living wage - not just a minimum wage - and we believe local leaders should have the power to respond to that need through local policy. As my past votes and advocacy demonstrate, I strongly support raising the wage to help support and empower working families. Local government should have this power to uplift our communities. The resolution supports HB 422, by Representative Royce Duplessis, that repeals the state law that preempts local control of the minimum wage. Thank you to all the advocates for your hard work both here in New Orleans and up at the capitol; the New Orleans City Council stands with you.

AN EQUITABLE NEW ORLEANS

Doubled Size of City Supplier Diversity Office to Better Engage DBE and Local Businesses

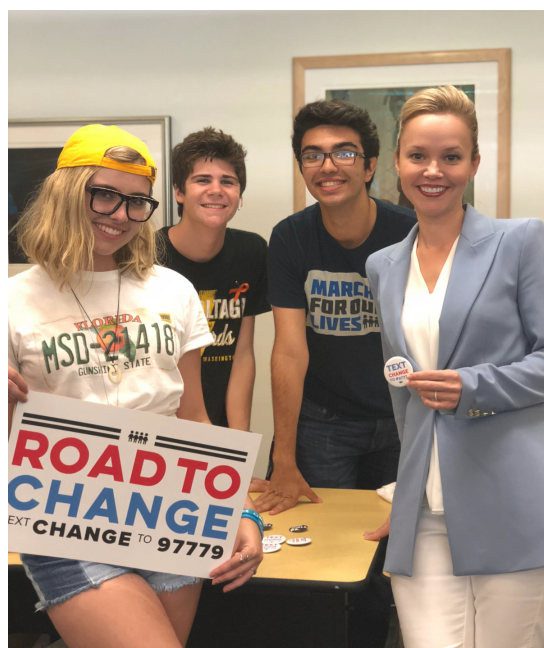
It is imperative that we are deliberate when it comes to attracting qualified, capable service providers to participate in city contracts. In order to better serve and engage DBEs, the Council prioritized doubling the size of the city's Office of Supplier Diversity. Expanding the office is critical to growing DBE's capacity, providing the resources needed by business owners to assist them in the RFP processes, expanding the capacity of the office to continue to monitor DBE compliance requirements, and diminishing the glaring economic disparity in our community.

Authored Disadvantaged Business Requirements to Apply to City Council Contracts

In September 2018, I joined with Councilmember Banks to author Ordinance 32,393 that enhanced the opportunities for Disadvantaged Business Enterprises interested in competing for contracts with the New Orleans City Council. This ordinance, which sets forth standards for the Council that mirror those already codified in previous years for the executive branch, is a first step forward as this Council continues to open opportunity for all New Orleanians and provide more equitable treatment for local DBEs. I believe strongly in building a more equitable city where everyone has the opportunity to compete and win business in order to create jobs and grow wealth. This is a great step in advancing our contracting framework in order to further provide opportunity for New Orleanians with the skills and the passion to compete for and win public work.

Addressing Pay Disparity Head On

Our state ranks 48th in employment and earnings for female workers, with Louisiana women earning an average of 69% of what white males earn. For women of color, it is even worse: black women earn just 47% for every dollar earned by white men. At the current pace, Louisiana women won't see pay equity until 2115. In New Orleans, the City Council has taken aggressive steps to end the wage gap and promote fairness in the workplace, including moving forward with the first study to determine disparities within city government. Resolution R-18-385 expressed the City Council's strong commitment to equal pay for equal work and directed the Civil Service Commission to execute a Pay Disparity Study. This study will develop a pay analysis of actual wages paid with a breakdown by gender, classification, base pay, and other factors as



well as identify unintentional instances of discrimination caused by job segregation and other factors. Looking forward, I will review key recommendations such as the estimated cost to close the wage gap, the types of educational opportunities and training materials to help employees understand equal pay requirements, and proposed processes for employees to seek recourse within city government when pay discrimination is suspected. In April 2019, I also joined Councilmember Jared Brossett on Ordinance Cal. No. 32,531 which establishes the Equal Pay Advisory Committee to provide advice, feedback, guiding principles, policies and subject matter expertise to the City Council on matters relating to pay equality, wage discrimination, and poverty in New Orleans. As a State Legislator, I sponsored, testified on behalf of, and fought for a variety of pay equity legislation. I am once again supporting action on the state level in 2019 as a strong supporter of SB136 by Senator JP Morrell, a measure designed to end wage secrecy and gender pay discrimination.

Standing on the Shoulders of Giants

I had the distinct pleasure of presenting proclamations on behalf of Governor John Bel Edwards and the New Orleans City Council recognizing the life and legacy of Reverend Dr. Samson "Skip" Alexander who passed away in March. He was a veteran of the Korean War, a lifelong Civil Rights activist, and historian; his impact on this city and our nation is immeasurable and we are so grateful for his sacrifices and voice. Resolution R-18-318 honored the life and legacy of human rights activist and political leader, Felicia Kahn. Felicia was a dear friend and mentor, and I am grateful for her advocacy. She left her mark with so many organizations, including the League of Women Voters, HDLC, National Council of Jewish Women New Orleans, the New Orleans Coalition, and the Alliance for Affordable Energy, among many others. Her seven decades of work certainly open doors to increased equity for all our citizens and she will remain an inspiration to me always.

A RESILIENT NEW ORLEANS

Pushed to Rebuild Our Streets with Best Standards in Green and Blue Infrastructure

Projects like The Gentilly Resilience District reduce flood risk, slow land subsidence, improve energy reliability, and encourage neighborhood revitalization. They have the power to directly impact public health and safety, boost economic opportunity, raise awareness of environmental education, and create spaces for recreation. Large-scale projects, like Mirabeau Water Garden, will absorb a lot of water but small changes can also make a huge impact. Under the new Community Adaptation Program, the city can issue grants to qualified low- to moderate-income Gentilly residents to build green infrastructure at their homes. The grants will be worth up to \$25,000 and will be used to pay for architectural services, to tear up concrete, and to install things like rain barrels and rain gardens. Implementing changes to residential properties helps prevent street flooding after major weather events. In addition to moving forward on physical projects, we must also be considerate of existing barriers to stormwater projects. Stormwater Motion M-19-151 resulted from collaboration between the City Planning Commission and the Office of Resilience that would make stormwater management principal use projects a Permitted rather than



a Conditional Use in many zoning districts throughout the city. We must ease unnecessary regulatory hurdles that can slow the construction of the larger storm water management projects around the city that help lessen urban flooding.

Created New Tools to Help the City Prosecute Anyone that Blocks Drainage to Avoid Increased Flood Risks for Homes and Businesses

It is vital that we bolster the work by the Sewerage & Water Board pumping systems with a strategy that includes working alongside city departments, agencies, the citizens, and other stakeholders to collaborate on meaningful enforcement and deterrence strategies to improve the efficacy of our city's drainage systems. Resolution R-18-339 recognized the impact urban water and severe weather incidents can have upon public safety, personal property, and business continuity. A subsequent ordinance, Cal. No. 32,376, focused directly on the obstruction and depositing of harmful materials into the city's drainage systems - including catch basins and drainage canals - and increased penalties for violations. It is imperative that members of the community - citizens and business owners alike - recognize that construction and demolition materials, concrete washout, hazardous liquids, trash or refuse, and demolition debris, when deposited into the city's drainage, can create dangerous flooding and compounds existing issues with water management in New Orleans.

Crafted the City's First Infrastructure Fund to Create Reliable Resources for Road, Drainage, and Other Projects

This year, Councilmember Giarrusso and I co-sponsored the Infrastructure Maintenance Fund creation (Ordinance 32,526). Funds would be generated by special tax authorized and approved by the voters of New Orleans for infrastructure maintenance and would be used by the City of New Orleans to build, maintain, clean, manage, beautify, improve, operate, repair, replace, implement and/or upkeep drainage and other infrastructure projects. If leveraged, this could impact equipment and technology upgrades, replacement of damaged catch basins, assist with debris removal, support transportation projects, aid with sewerage and drainage line repair or replacement, and address other safety improvements.

Led Rejuvenation of Utilities Regulation to Finally Hold Entergy and Other Utilities Accountable to the Ratepayers They Serve and Fined Entergy a Record \$5 Million Dollars for Misleading the Public

As Chair of the Utilities Committee, we moved to finally build in-house capacity in our Council Regulatory office in order to save ratepayers money by reducing our reliance on outside contractors. New Orleans deserves a strong, internal regulatory power that helps our citizens get the most out of our utilities. By building our own office, we free ourselves from large consultant contracts while employing New Orleanians to help grow our capacity as a city to stand on our own two feet. Additionally, one of my first acts as the Utility Chair was to author Motion M-18-196 to begin a formal investigation of



Entergy New Orleans (ENO) and to retain an independent investigator regarding the use of paid actors during the NOPS public comment process. Ultimately, the City Council placed a \$5 million fine against the company for using paid actors (Resolution R-19-7), prohibits Entergy from passing that fine onto ratepayers, and requires Entergy New Orleans to work with the Sewerage & Water Board to improve the company's power generation capacity. This represents the largest single penalty ever imposed by the City Council. The resolution also requires Entergy to file an application if it becomes aware of the possible need for expenditures on the plant that put the total cost above \$211 million. The council will then have to review the spending and find it to be prudent before Entergy can recover those costs.
